# **Newstart Education Centre**



#### Overview of Newstart's Work

As an Alternative Education Centre, Newstart has developed a multi-disciplinary and innovative approach to the formal and informal education of young people who, for a wide variety of reasons found / find themselves outside the mainstream school system while providing access to support services for them and their families.

The team at Newstart promotes Young People's (Re)engagement in education and training to realize their potential and improve their life opportunities and choices. Many of our Young People face complex issues and find the safe, welcoming and professional environment where they are individually valued, respected and indeed challenged, one where they can achieve and turn their lives around. Similarly our Parents / Families and stakeholders engage much more effectively and find the team very inclusive, supportive and understanding. The multi-disciplinary team at Newstart works at enabling young people to re-engage with education, to become independent and to reintegrate into communities in which they live.

Newstart provides a range of courses, support and opportunities for adult learners, lone parents economically inactive and unemployed people. As part of the Alternative Education Providers Forum, Newstart is also involved in facilitating seminars, research, lobbying and campaigning.

#### **Achievement and Success**

Newstart Education Centre as always is very proud of the young people and learners, and this year is no different. We are very proud of the host of qualifications that our young people achieved. Some of our young people achieved some of the highest GCSE grades that the centre has had. All our young people left with qualifications in Literacy and Numeracy as well as qualifications in sports leadership, healthy living, PSHE, and life skills. We also had adult learners who achieved their level three Classroom Assistants course.

This is a big achievement and will allow these learners to move forward into the world of work in this field 50% so far have obtained employment.



### Jumpstart @ Newstart

The Jumpstart programme this year has continued to work with groups from the AEP Forum and mainstream education providers including Newstart Education Centre, Conway Mill, Pathways and Corpus Christi College. This work consists of a holistic approach from staff, using outdoor settings as a means to best support overall learning and development. Particular focus and value is placed on adventure learning, one to one support and peer supported learning in order to explore resilience, reflection and positive coping strategies.

Jumpstart enjoyed a great year working with various centres and young people from all over Belfast. The Programme allowed young people the opportunity to gain support while exploring some of the most scenic and beautiful areas our country has to offer. Feedback from many of the young people stated that without the programmes activities and sessions, they wouldn't have visited or experienced these outstanding locations.

We have continued to work with and address issues such as mental health, suicide, anxiety, depression, anger management, substance misuse and poverty. However this year we seen an increase in issues around technology such as mobiles, social networks and gaming, which appeared to disrupt young people's daily routines in a negative way.

Previous amendments to the way in which we worked with Pathways groups have proved efficient and is now the way in which we will be operating. This arrangement involves working with each site separately on a twelve weekly basis.

The Jumpstart team this year said farewell to Resilience coach Joseph Dickey and welcomed in our new member of staff David Gibney to the post.







# **Newstart Education Centre**



Family, Health and Support Work at Newstart: This has been another good and particularily busy year for the Family Health Support project. There have been many positive outcomes for our students, their families and community outreach groups. Alongside this we have been able to at times of crisis to support, advocate on behalf of and sign post on for our parents who do a great job at often very stressful times. Give yourselves a pat on the back.

During the year we identified and delivered a range of health programmes to a number of community youth groups. Topics included Self Awareness, Suicide Awareness, Emotional Well being and Positive Mental Health.

We had a great number participating in our transition programmes. We strive to make the changeover as easy as possible for all those involved. Responses and feedback from these and our transition sessions has been amazing, attendance was a great indicator of the success of all the programmes.

During this period we were fortunate enough to be able to invite a number of organisations in to enhance our teaching. Thank you to Lighthouse, Brooke NI, Eating Disorders, Belfast City Council and West Belfast Area Project.

Well done to all our students for all your hard work both in and out of the classroom. This has also been an exciting but emotional time as we have seen our leavers develop, mature and grow in confidence enabling them to continue with their education and employability prospects.

Congratulations all out leavers and participants on your achievements. Thank you to our funders and heres to another successful year ahead and to the future.

**GRIP 2016/17:** The GRIP (Good Relation and Innovative Practice) programme 2016/2017, worked with young people to develop a greater awareness, knowledge and acceptance of all who live in our communities in Northern Ireland. This programme aimed to move away from the traditional notion of community relations and include those considered most vulnerable in our society.


It was delivered to the needs wants and desires of the young people who we identified as participants, all of whom were deemed "stretch to reach young people."

We believe that in order to help "build a united community", all aspects and individuals in the community should be included as part of awareness raising to promote acceptance and tolerance. This vital work includes:

- · The PUL and CRN communities
- BME community
- Traveller community
- Refugees and Asylum Seekers

Alongside this work the programmes examines minorities as priorities this includes, Gender Awareness, LGB&T Awareness, Ageism, Disabilities and cultural differences between urban and rural communities, and challenging perpetuating myths and stereotypes.

The young people involved in GRIP developed a resource in the form of a board game which they called "Get a GRIP!" This is a resource for professionals to use to generate discussion on all aspects of Good Relations which was launched in the 147 Trust in March and was hosted by Barra Best. We hope to roll this resource out to other organisations across Northern Ireland in the coming year.



The programme was delivered with the support of the NI Executive Office, Together: Building United Communities.
